- Recorded and transcribed
- 2 months field work
- 34 interviews done
- Ethical considerations

Findings

- The values of conservation:
- Personal and intrinsic values
- Historical values
- Natural values and responsibility
- Business and green promotion
- Living off the land/knowledge
- Politics and conservation

Challenges of Landowners being involved in conservation

- Time constraints
- Financial limitations
- Preferred not working with governments directly- felt excluded and sense of distrust.
- Differing values between landowners and government in conservation

Experiences in FV program

- Open and continuous communication
- Trusting relationship
- Inclusion- landowners prefer to be directly involved in conservation occurring on their land
- Financial sustainability issues
- Time constraints

Conclusions

- Landowners key role players in conservation
- Conservancies play an important role
- Their experiences, perceptions and knowledge can not be over looked
- Different reasons for participating in conservation
- Different actors playing out in conservation

- FVCT has good partnerships with donors, these relationships should also continue to be a priority.
- FVCT has potential to make conservation affordable over time for landowners to continue with maintenance of aliens.
- Most respondents agreed the project should be extended and they would continue to play roles in conservation.
- Most landowners preferred to work with FV rather than the government directly.
- There is a strong case for FV to continue.
